Our students receive strong classroom instruction everyday from a group of highly skilled teachers and educational assistants. Alongside this, we have a number of programs to support students with not only their academic needs but their social emotional needs. Below is a list of some of the supports we provide and access.

- Early Literacy Intervention
- Small group pull-out interventions for both math and literacy
- A rehabilitation assistant to help students with speech, fine motor, and gross motor needs.
- Student Support room to help students regulate their emotions
- · Sensory Room to assist with sensory regulation
- Extra government funding for 22/23 to help with learning loss caused by the pandemic
- Family School Wellness Worker
- · Social Emotional Specialists hired by CESD
- Recess and friendship groups to help develop social skills
- YESS program from AHS to support social and emotional needs.

We make every effort to support our students not only academically, but socially and emotionally as well.

The Indigenous Outdoor Classroom

We are working on growing our outdoor classroom. We had an amazing Love Bug dance to kick off the fundraising to add to the classroom. The outdoor classroom is a space used by all students. Teachers take their classes there to learn in an alternative environment. Students work on science projects, writing projects, art, and social studies in this space. First Nation Metis and Inuit learning has been added into our curriculum and teaching quality standards. Therefore, we want to use this space to support this learning with the addition of indigenous plants, and a teepee.

This space will continue to be a collaborative space for all to enjoy.



Building Social Emotional Wellness

- A message from Superintendent Kurt Sacher

Various studies and multiple observations tell us it is a challenging time for young people and their social-emotional well being. We take this seriously in Chinook's Edge, and we are focused on making a difference in this key area. Why? We know when students are well emotionally, it sets them up for success in every other area of their lives, including learning at school.

The Chinook's Edge approach to this work can be visualized in a pyramid. It is a multi-layered and proactive approach. Our work begins at the bottom of the pyramid with programming that reaches all students. Moving up the pyramid, our work becomes more tailored to individual students who need additional support. A key element of this plan is the inclusion of families.



In summary, starting at the bottom of the pyramid, here is how Chinook's Edge is supporting students:

- YES = Youth Empowerment & Support program.
 Proactive building social emotional wellness in all K-8 classrooms. Also targeted groups at lunch, after school and in the summer.
- SEW 15 Social Emotional Wellness 15 is a high school course created to build social emotional wellness for students.
- FSW = Family School Wellness. FSW workers help students individually and in small groups to support mild to moderate needs. Families are connected to the conversation and strategies to support student's social emotional well-being.
- SET = Social Emotional Teams are based in each school. They work with individual students, and potentially their families, to support moderate to severe mental health challenges.
- MHTC / MFEW = Mental Health Transition
 Consultant / McMan Enrichment Workers. MHTC
 coordinates with SET specialists to provide support
 to students experiencing severe mental health or
 emotional challenges. MFEW provides in-home
 family support.

Of note, Chinook's Edge and its partners received a \$1.4 million provincial grant for a two-year mental health pilot. The grant allows us to hire the MHTC and MFEW workers. Also, the Chinook's Edge Board financially supports the YES, FSW and SET teams with close to \$3 million in funding annually. And, at a more granular level, we have amazing staff who are very committed to helping our students. This is very important work.
